Ribbon Cuttings in Bartlett and Burwell

The Village of Bartlett held a ribbon cutting celebrating the end of their streets project. Bartlett was awarded a \$420,279 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) through the Department of Economic Development (DED) for the replacement of Randolph Street. The project replaced the old, broken concrete with new, thicker concrete. Randolph Street is the main street in Bartlett receiving high amounts of traffic, connecting Highway 281 to the only school in Wheeler County. Impact has been deeply felt through safer streets for the schoolkids and easier access to rural family





The **City of Burwell**, with the assistance of Central Nebraska Economic Development District, received a **\$516,520** grant from Nebraska Affordable Housing Trust Fund to construct **two single-family homes consisting of 3-bedrooms**, **2-bathrooms**, and **2-car garage for income-qualified individuals and families**.

The Nebraska Affordable Housing Trust Fund (NAHTF) was established in 1996 by the Nebraska Affordable Housing Act to address a shortage of quality affordable housing. Housing shortages

limit an individual's choice of where to live and the ability to seek and sustain employment. Our workforce is directly affected by the quality and cost of housing. For individuals, quality affordable housing is the basis for economic stability and self-sufficiency. For communities, schools, and businesses, it is a critical part of any sustainable, successful community economic development strategy.
